UNITY Alliance Meeting (Aiken)

The first meeting of UNITY Alliance for the 2006-2007 academic year will take place on September 7th from 12:15 to 1:15pm in room 201 in the H&SS Building on USC Aiken campus. SC Equality Coalition to host Activist Training Summit Aug 19-20th (Columbia)

The state-wide summit will be held in Columbia over the August 19-20th weekend, and is meant to train people on SCEC's message, as well as the elements of grassroots organizing. Professional national trainers from the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD), the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), and the Highlander Research and Education Center will be presenting workshops. According to leaders of SCEC, the ultimate goal is to draw people from all across the state so they can return to their own communities prepared with the skills necessary to effectively organize and create a base of social justice work in South Carolina. Speakers will include Suzanne Pharr and Mandy Carter. Pharr, a longtime activist who has worked to eliminate sexism and racism, became the first woman director of the Highlander Center in 1999. Carter, who has also been a life long activist, helped found Southerners on New Ground (SONG) in 1993 and was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2005. SC Equality Coalition Matching Grant campaign extended thru August

SC Equality Coalition is hoping to generate financial support for both the campaign against the Family Discrimination Amendment and for local gay and lesbian advocacy groups. Two generous SCEC donors Linda Ketner and Beth Huntley, have offered to donate up to \$100,000 in funds, matching dollar-for-dollar funds raised by individual local organizations. The funds raised by the local organizations (such as GLPM in Columbia, AFFA in Charleston, etc.) will go towards the campaign to educate state voters about the discriminatory amendment that will be on the ballot in November. At the end of the matching grant campaign, the money donated by each individual organization will be donated back to that organization by Ketner and Huntley.

The two donors hope that the act of donating matching funds back to the local groups for the money each organization raises for the campaign will do more than simply donating their money to the campaign outright. By challenging local organizations to raise funds for the match, these donors are encouraging greater participation from the general community for fighting discrimination in the state. The members and volunteers gained through the matching grant campaign will be an asset to the community as a whole that will far outlast the November election.

For GLPM members wishing to contribute to this campaign, checks should be made out to SC Equality Coalition, with "GLPM" or "the Harriet Hancock Center Foundation" written in the memo line. SCEC will then donate, dollar-for-dollar, your donation amount to GLPM using the funds they receive from the generous donors mentioned above. It has finally been established that the Family Discrimination Amendment will be Amendment #1 on the ballot in November. SCEC will now be working to spread the message "Vote NO on 1" in the coming months. The official number for the amendment should help press coverage of the referendum, giving it an official name other than "marriage amendment" which has been commonly used in the media. Keep an eye out for bumper stickers, buttons and advertisements which say "Vote NO on 1!"

Helping Out the Community:

Defeating the SC Marriage Amendment

What the Amendment Says:

Article XVII of the SC Constitution would be amended by adding:

A marriage between one man and one woman is the only lawful domestic union that shall be valid or recognized in this State. This State and its political subdivisions shall not create a legal status, right or claim respecting any other domestic union, however denominated. This State and its political subdivisions shall not recognize or give effect to a legal status, right or claim created by another jurisdiction respecting any other domestic union, however denominated. Nothing in this section shall impair any right or benefit extended by the State or its political subdivisions other than a right or benefit arising from a domestic union that is not valid or recognized in this State. This section shall not prohibit or limit parties, other than the State or its political subdivisions, from entering into contracts or other legal instruments.

What You Can Do to Help Defeat the Amendment

Be an Active Voice

- **Talk to your family, friends and neighbors.**

If people have a face – a friend, neighbor or family member – to identify with the issue, they are much less likely to support anti-gay legislation. Come out if you can, but don't be afraid of "outing" yourself by discussing the amendment. If you aren't comfortable being out, identify yourself as a concerned citizen who believes in fairness for all people. Some of our best allies are our straight supporters!

- **Write letters to editors of newspapers and magazines.**

Read through the talking points and pointers on letters-to-the-editor listed below. It is easy, and the talking points offer a variety of angles.

- **Be aware of what others are saying about your life, your values, your family, and the amendment.**

Campaigns such as the pro-amendment campaign in South Carolina work by increasing people's fear. In the coming months, there will be increasing media coverage of the amendment. The pro-amendment's campaign will paint a prejudiced, homophobic view of the LGBT community, and will attempt to misrepresent the amendment as a "definition and defense of marriage." The amendment will do nothing of the sort – it is written to sweepingly wipe out any legal recognition of gay and lesbian couples, and designate the LGBT community as second-class citizens.

When you hear untruths about the LGBT community or this discriminatory amendment, speak up! Write a letter to the editor. Call or e-mail TV and/or radio stations. E-mail the Harriet Hancock Community Center at SCPrideCenter@aol.com and let us know. Don't let discriminatory lies and prejudiced fear stand. Only you can correct the misconceptions and misinformation.

- **Donate time, money or supplies to SC Equality Coalition.**

SC Equality Coalition has established Action Teams across the state. Find out more about the Action Team near you by contacting Melissa Moore at mmoore@scequality.org. There are various volunteer opportunities from now until November – and beyond!

Tips for Writing Letters and Discussing the Amendment

Ed Madden's suggestions on writing letters you would like printed and read by the public:

You can email your letter (do not send as attachment but in the body of the email) to the State at stateeditor@thestate.com or fax it to 803.771.8639. You can mail it to Letters to the Editor, The State, PO Box 1333, Columbia SC 29202. Include your name, address, and daytime phone number.

A few points to remember:

- KEEP IT SHORT! 200 words or fewer!
- KEEP IT FOCUSED! Focus on one or two points.
- KEEP IT SIMPLE! Short sentences and short paragraphs.
- KEEP IT TIMELY! Refer to a recent news story or event.
- SEND IT NOW!!

A few talking points for letters or conversations:

- This amendment is about a lot more than marriage. It should more accurately be called a family discrimination amendment because it decides what kind of families matter and what kinds of families deserve recognition.
- The amendment would prohibit gay marriage, but it would also prohibit civil unions, domestic partnerships, or any other form of legal recognition and protection for gay and lesbian families.
- The amendment would deny any form of legal recognition for straight couples who are not legally married. In Ohio, a similar amendment resulted in a weakening of domestic violence laws. Men who had been convicted of domestic violence against their girlfriends had their charges lessened because the court no longer recognized their unmarried relationship status.
- Many Fortune 500 companies offer some form of domestic partnership benefits. This amendment would jeopardize the legality of these benefits. This would impact business relocation in South Carolina and hurt recruitment of highly qualified workers.
- Same-sex couples recognized in other states would lose their relationship rights as soon as they enter South Carolina. A committed gay couple traveling through the state on vacation would have no hospital visitation rights or legal recognition if something were to happen to them while in South Carolina.
- According to the 2000 U.S. Census, South Carolina is fourth in the nation for same-sex couples raising children. These are real South Carolina families, and it is these families and these children who will be devastated by this amendment.
- Media coverage should recognize that this amendment is about a great deal more than marriage. This amendment will make it constitutionally impossible for many South Carolinians to legally protect their families and their children.
